The following list identifies those species of mammals that occur in Indiana. Each family is arranged alphabetically by scientific name. Some species occur over most of the State. Others have a very limited range. Hypothetical species are those that may occur but are not yet reported or confirmed.

This list was compiled from several sources, including the Princeton University Press Mammals of North America by Kays and Wilson (2002), the Revised Checklist of the Vertebrates of Indiana by T. P. Simon, J. O. Whitaker, J. S. Castrale and S. A.
